Preschool age children begin to notice similarities and differences at a young age. By age three, children begin to show signs of being influenced by societal norms and biases and may exhibit "pre prejudice" toward others on the basis of gender or race or being differently abled (Derman-Sparks, et al). Learning alongside peers of all abilities, races and ethnicities provides our youngest learners with opportunities to embrace and enjoy differences. Children learn to have authentic conversations about their differences and begin to understand the value of differences in our world. This is inclusion. This is part of our mission to provide ALL children with the opportunity to learn and play in the natural world.

Over the last three years, Little Hawks Discovery Preschool (LHDP) has been working behind the scenes with Hamilton Community Schools (HCS) to develop a nature-based inclusion preschool experience. In preparation for the 2021-2022 launch of nature-based inclusion, LHDP and HCS observed inclusion preschools around the state, attended many hours of training and created a task force focused on implementation. Little Hawks Discovery Preschool had partners at the Ottawa Area ISD observe Little Hawks classes to evaluate best practices in special education and provide feedback for improvement prior to the launch. Together, we learned that the model we have created is not truly seen anywhere else in our state.



Starting in the 2021-2022 school year, LHDP teachers and HCS Special Education Staff work together daily to support children with and without learning differences. If you could peek in on the class, you would see all teachers dressed for the weather, immersed in play with children and coaching them in all developmental areas at the Outdoor Discovery Center. Children of all abilities are spending all or most of their school day outdoors, in all weather. This allows for all types of learners to thrive together—catching frogs, following animal tracks, writing about adventures, sharing their wonders, making mud pies and so much more! These preschool days will leave an impact on the hearts of children for understanding, empathy for one another and respect for our natural world. ODC Network has much gratitude and respect for the educators involved in this launch. They are the ones that are changing education to truly impact the growth of the whole child!

Robin Williams said it right when he made that exclamation. Spring is the time of year when things that were once dormant or gone can be found full of energy again. buzzing to collect spider webs for their nests, flycatchers snapping up insects, blackbirds proudly defending their territory or warblers whistling their sweet songs as they gobble up insects. Construction Underway at Dragonflies Discovery Preschool



Our Dragonflies Discovery Preschool campus continues to evolve as our contractors are hard at work. If you drive by today, you will see our maintenance garage is in place along with the two main education buildings that each house two classrooms. The offices, childcare, and allpurpose education and training space will be constructed soon.

Before the winter weather set in, all the foundations, utility lines, parking lot, entrance

drive, and water features were constructed. There is much work yet to be done, but we are excited to see this new community asset taking shape.

We opened registration for this program in early January. More than 100 students have already registered for the program which will begin in September 2022.

In a relatively short period of time, we have raised nearly \$4 million of the \$4.5 million need for the project. As we approach spring, we hope to have all the funding secured so we can focus on wrapping up the construction work.

We are hopeful construction will be completed by the beginning of August. The trail system, natural features, nature-play areas, and interpretive features will be installed this summer.







Warmer Weather Awakens Aquatic Macroinvertebrates

Aquatic macroinvertebrates are critters that live in lakes and streams including insects, crustaceans, clams, and snails. They vary in

shape and size, but all live in the water for at least a portion of their life cycle. Many are food for fish and play an important role in the aquatic ecosystem. Different types of macroinvertebrates have different sensitivities to water pollution. We can look at the abundance and type of macroinvertebrates in a



stream to get a general idea of stream health. Most macroinvertebrates live in the stream bottom among rocks, under logs or in leaf

> packs, making them pretty easy to collect with a net. Collecting and processing macroinvertebrates is also something easily done with the help of volunteers. We monitor macroinvertebrate populations twice a year at seven stream locations in the Macatawa Watershed.

Good Bugs Amphipods and Caddisflig cannot live in water with pollutants, so finding them means the water must be very clean!



After collecting samples, teams identify and sort types of macroinvertebrates using supplies like plastic spoons, tweezers, and ice cube trays. A simple equation based on the totals then calculates a health "score" for the stream. Join us May 12 to experience it firsthand!





Moderate Indicators Crayfish and beetles can tolerate some pollution, streams that can harbor them are doing ok!

Poor Water Quality Snails and damselflies can live in poor water conditions. If they're the only living thing in a waterway, it means conditions are poor enough that none of the other critters can live there.



Assessment Sheet Quantities of each ategory of bug are tallied and a score can be assigned!
