Native Connections Supported by Women of Color GIVE Grant

This past year the ODC Network team met with various Anishinaabe tribes/members locally and regionally here in Michigan. In February, staff visited the Ziibiwing Center which features cultural exhibits presented by the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan. During the month of April some staff toured the Pokagon Band of Potawatomi Center of History and Culture, virtually presented about the ODC Cultural History Center program expansion to the Michigan Anishinaabek Cultural Preservation & Repatriation Alliance, consulted with the Anishinaabe curator at the Grand Rapids Public Museum, and co-hosted a native sustainability community conversation with a Pokagon Band tribal staff member at DeGraaf Nature Center.

In May, we hosted the Gun Lake Band and Pokagon Band tribal staff on seperate visits where they toured the Outdoor Discovery Center, including the Cultural History Center trail and exhibit. Great conversations were sparked regarding collaborative work through the ODC Network and tribal communities.



ODC staff were then encouraged to visit some local summer Powwows. In June, ODC staff learned about Powwow etiquette at a class hosted by the Gun Lake Band. In July, staff attended the Sweetgrass Moon Powwow held at the Jijak Camp in Hopkins. Four ODC staff members joined in on the fun event featuring tribal drums, dance performers, native craft vendors, native food vendors, and a community feast. We participated in an intertribal dance in the arena where all the dances took place, and were honored to be invited to participate in the sacred fire offering (using the 4 traditional medicines). Taking home food and gift items purchased from the native vendors was a great way to contribute to these small native businesses.



Volunteer Groups Contribute to Our Success



MillerKnoll employees have volunteered at ODC since 2002. Over 1,000 employees have removed invasive plants, helped build playscapes and benches, and more. This year MillerKnoll employees rebuilt a bridge at our Macatawa River Greenway site, Poppen Woods, and plan to build a kiosk there as well.

Preferred Employment is a local agency that works with adults with special needs to prepare them for the workforce. Between July and August, they visited the ODC

River Junction Preserve Grand Opening

Join our team in celebrating the public opening of the River Junction Preserve on Saturday, October 7. We will be at the site from 10-2pm to introduce you to the property, provide a chance to chat with our staff who have been working on the planning and restoration, and grab a snack.

Beginning October 8, the property will be open from dawn to dusk like our other preserves. The site will have numerous trail loops through the upland forest, while a longer out-and-back trail can take hikers all the way to the confluence of the Rabbit and Kalamazoo Rivers.

We've been working hard getting the property ready to share, which has been helped by several volunteer groups and funding from the Kalamazoo River Trustees. This has included putting in new gates and a parking area, dealing with some encroaching invasive species, grading out and cleaning up trails, and installing maps and signage.



Our Outdoor Skills Summer Camp was the first group to be able to use the River Junction Preserve this past August, putting their

orienteering and survival skills to the test on our newest, largest property. The size of the property was an incredible asset, making the orienteering lesson more interesting and challenging as the markers were further apart in all directions.

The banks of the river were the perfect setting for testing soil transpiration methods for gathering water, and gathering water to ensure fire-starting attempts stayed on the desired tinder piles. The richness of wilderness presented both a better opportunity to see unique plants and animals, as well as more separation from the real world, lending a more authentic feel to a survival situation that would require the skills explored at camp.



Supporting Our Watersheds



On Saturday, August 12th, we held the **Macatawa Water Festival** on Windmill Island. While there was a bit of rain early, sunshine gave way and we had a lovely day where visitors were able to interact with over 20 hands-on learning activities and crafts about water.







The fourth annual **Cultivating Resilience Farm Field Day** took place on August 17th. An unfavorable weather forecast necessitated a move from the Morren Crops & Cattle farm to Noordeloos Christian Reformed Church. Despite this and other unforeseen changes, attendees were able to learn about how to evaluate soil health, the use of drone technology in farming, applications for agroforestry in farming operations, and hear conservation experiences from a panel of local farmers.







Peter's Creek Restoration Update

Our team returned to Peters Creek this July, working to stabilize another section of this notoriously erosive stream. The site selected for restoration this year has been on our 'most wanted' list for nearly a decade, and funding from the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes,

and Energy allowed us to tackle this stretch near Overisel Township Hall. Located a couple of miles upstream from our previous restorations at Poppen Woods, this section of creek





featured similar issues with downed trees, hairpin turns, scoured banks, and sediment deposits. Complicating factors included multiple

buried gas lines under the stream channel and a seasonal swale that ferries in excess storm runoff from a nearby field. Using the same natural design techniques used on previous projects, our partners from Niswander Environmental, Green Watershed Restoration, and 28 Specialties tackled this roughly 1300' stretch. In this process, we actually shortened the length of the stream itself, while leaving some of the biggest bends intact but no longer connected to the channel. These disconnected bends, called oxbows, are already a great hangout spot for local frogs, turtles, and insects.

Education Network: Summer Success

This summer, the ODC Education Network provided summer literacy enrichment support to over 1000 elementary students and their teachers. Our team provided on site support and experiences to local school partners in Holland, Grand Haven, West Ottawa, Fennville, Jenison, and Allegan County.





summer literacy camps were also able to enjoy recreational activities in nature as part of their experience. These recreation experiences build a multi-sensory understanding of the world, increase program comprehension, and provide equitable opportunities to try a new activity.



Students had regular and consistent access to fresh, healthy, and non-packaged snacks that helped them learn about nutrition, food preference, and sensory response. This was part of each camp's daily social-emotional learning.
