Winter Activities to try on the Greenway

Afraid of getting a little stir crazy this winter? Don't be! There are plenty of opportunities to get outside that don't involve a cramped airplane flight to a far-off destination. Consider trying these opportunities at one of the many partner parks along the Macatawa Greenway.

Sledding: One of the best sledding hills in the area is located at Van Raalte Farm in Holland. Park at the entrance of 24th Street for closest access, or take a walk through the woods and meadows by parking at one of the other entrances. It's a great way for the kids to burn some energy!



Cross-country skiing: The Upper Macatawa Natural Area is a bike rider's paradise in the warm months. During the winter, many of the same hiking and biking paths become usable for cross-country skiers and snowshoers. Park at either entrance (84th or 76th Avenue in Zeeland) to hike through the expansive trails through the hills and floodplain along the upper reaches of the Macatawa River.

Snowshoeing: If you are new to snowshoeing and want to try it out, you're always welcome to use one of our pairs at the Outdoor Discovery Center when we have enough snowpack. But if you've already invested in your own pair, try heading over to Paw Paw Park in Holland. The east side in particular has expansive meadows and trails along the river to explore.



Bird watching: There are plenty of birds that stay in West Michigan or come here for the winter. Many hardy ducks and other waterfowl can stick around as long as there is a patch of open water. Check out the channel going between Lake Macatawa and Lake Michigan, which is often a waypoint for travelling birds. You can park at either the Black Lake Boardwalk or Holland State Park. Bring binoculars and protection against the wind. You may come across some interesting finds, such as Barrow's goldeneye, long tailed duck, or even a bald eagle!

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Winter Wildlife Walk (Holland Energy Park)

Come with us as we walk Window on the Waterfront trails and Holland's famous snowmelt system in search of winter wildlife. Superb Owl Prowl (Sanctuary Woods)

Flashlights are welcome. Dress for the weather! Please note this hike does include approximately 170 stairs up a dune.

Snowshoe Hike (Bysterveld Park)

We are partnering with Allegan County Parks to offer a family snowshoe hike. Hikers will explore the trails of Bysterveld County Park in search of interesting animals and plants while walking in wooden, Ojibwa-style snowshoes. The snowshoes are ideal for people aged 8 years and up. Participants are welcome to wear their own snowshoes and bring a sled for little ones to be pulled while hiking.

Be prepared to be outside the entire time hiking. At least 4 inches of snow base is required for our snowshoes.

Building Nature-based Playscapes in Our Community

Over the past five years, the ODC Operations team has been hard at work designing and building eight nature playscapes: three on-site and five at different schools in the surrounding Holland area. While many playgrounds feature manufactured metal or plastic-based structures, our team combines the beautiful organic shapes of nature, with the function of more typical playscapes. These handbuilt structures utilize natural hardwood logs that have not been treated, intentionally allowing stations to transition into new and exciting micro-environments for children to explore. "Any child can play on a plastic rocket ship, but that is all it can ever be," states Ops Manager, Mike Oosting. "When they approach these logs, the structures can become anything. We want to remove the boxes that have been placed on their creativity."

The unique set of design and building skills that our team demonstrates has allowed them to become pioneers in the community, both in teaching their skills so that others may create similar scapes, and providing the types of outdoor learning environments that our students deserve and require to succeed.

By playing on our climbing settings, kids will learn risk management, develop their problem solving skills, gross motor skills, and communication methods, improve their selfdiscipline, and discover self-accomplishment.

Elements (like a climbing structure) are included in each design to positively impact children's health and development. Physically, plants and green spaces improve overall health, reduce stress, bolster immune systems, and increase physical activity. Socially, time



in nature promotes positive social behavior, encouraging children to share play spaces and work together. Academically, outdoor environments improve cognitive abilities, which is reflected in improved critical thinking skills and standardized test scores. By starting outdoor education early, children develop a

foundation for formal learning, and unearth an innate desire to study the natural world.

Immersion in our environment during young ages promotes stewardship in adulthood, which is needed now more than ever as natural spaces are in ongoing decline. Whether they are transforming existing natural



spaces, or returning developed spaces to their natural roots, our team is constantly creating more environments to explore. These spaces are not restricted to use only during the school day, but instead are an added asset in the community, providing a space for all ages to enjoy the inherent benefits.



Natural Treasures of the Sonoran Desert Photography Tour March 22-28, 2020

Wildlife photographers and bird watchers alike will explore the "Real, natural, Arizona". The group will start its trip in Tucson where they will be introduced to wildlife and plants of the southwest at the Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum. This world-renowned facility is a zoo, natural history museum, and botanical garden all in one. It will be a terrific springboard for the week with opportunities to see captive animals including hummingbirds, javalina, Gambel's quail, Mexican wolf, coati, and more. The site will also allow people unfamiliar with desert southwest plants and wildflowers to learn first-hand about many native species.

From our base camp in the Tucson area, we will find the perfect places to catch

sunrises and sunsets over the Sonoran desert including the iconic saguaro cactus. Other highlights of the experience will include a private photo session with native Arizona





wildlife and visits to our favorite locations to take in all that the desert has to offer.

Isle Royale June 15-21, 2020

Isle Royale National Park is an amazingly wild island national park located within the boundaries of Michigan in Lake Superior. The park's rugged features and stunning shoreline provide visitors with an immersive wilderness experience that is difficult to find in most locations. There are countless benefits to spending time in a wilderness setting and visiting this place will certainly help you get your "Vitamin N". Isle Royale National Park is the perfect place for those seeking solitude and respite from our daily lives.

While in the park, visitors will be treated to an abundance of plant and animal life, including some rare plants that are typically

mountain saxifrage. Isle Royale is also home to Devil's Club which can be found in the coastal rainforests of the Pacific Northwest north into Alaska. Isle Royale's wolf and moose populations have made this living laboratory a hotspot for researchers as they study the effects of predation on a population as well as how outside factors can affect population size.

Sylvania Wilderness Area Kayak Trip

August 1-6, 2020

The Sylvania Wilderness Area in Michigan's Upper Peninsula encompasses over 18,000 acres of the Ottawa National Forest near Watersmeet, MI. The wilderness has 34 named lakes and a large natural area of old growth forest providing habitat for a wide range of living things like rare



orchids, bald eagles, loons, and osprey. The forests consist of mostly virgin northern hardwoods mixed with patches of ancient white pines. The rolling hills and deep clear lakes were formed by glaciers thousands of years ago.

The group will spend three full days paddling and exploring the lakes and islands, as well as the many trails in search of wild things. Don't worry, there will be time for fishing or just relaxing in a hammock too! In the evenings we will return to our campsite for a wilderness dinner. This is a kayak camping trip, therefore appropriate camping gear is required.
